FROM THE OHHA PRESIDENT

We have completed greenway pathway repair and getting power to our irrigation system. Both are long-overdue repair/replacement projects with a cost approaching \$35,000. We have abandoned repair of the 153rd entry sign and the board voted not to fund replacement of playground equipment. The decision not to make these needed repairs is a result of homeowners not approving the dues increase at the annual meeting. These two replacement/repair projects have combined costs exceeding \$150,000.

Keeping Oak Hills attractive and operating is not cheap. Until homeowners approve a significant increase in dues to maintain our community, we will continue to look at delaying needed repairs. We will

also be forced to consider significant increases for RV lot and any other income-generating programs we have. As our maintenance and landscape department is the biggest annual operating expense, we will look hard at this area and see where we can cut costs.

While you may not notice changes tomorrow, over the coming years you will start to notice the gradual decline in our infrastructure and appearance of the community. You will notice increased charges for RV lot, drop box usage, facility rents, and more.

My final thought: fewer than 50% of homeowners bothered to vote on the dues increase. By not voting, does that mean 350 homeowners do not care about maintaining our community?

TREASURER'S UPDATE

The impressive Oak Hills July 4th celebration has come and gone, and I would like to say thank you to all of the volunteers who worked so diligently to make sure the 4th is truly special. I live on the "loop" and see literally hundreds of people walk by each year, and couldn't agree more with a pleasant couple walking by who said "Oak Hills is a wonderful place to be on the 4th."

Now to the money. Historically, the 4th has been essentially a break-even activity. We have been plus or minus \$1,000 in all of the past four years. And while we do not have all of the 2019 numbers finalized, it is apparent we will be in the same category this year.

The cost of the fireworks, which is the main expense of the day, has been defrayed largely by the cash collections at the entry portals of Oak Hills on the day of the 4th. And let me say a particular thank you to the volunteers who did such a terrific job collecting that cash.

In addition to those cash collections, there is a significant number of homeowners who make a dedicated contribution to the 4th of July Fund. Without those donations we would be quite short, so let me encourage you to make a voluntary contribution to the 4th of July Fund.

At our last board meeting we saw our first impact of the failure of the

proposed annual dues increase. There has been extensive work conducted by some talented people and some dedicated funds raised for new playground equipment. This work has been performed over the past year with the anticipation of accessing the Association's reserve fund for a good portion of the cost of the project. However, without secure funding for the *general* operation of the Association, the board voted to delay the funding of this project.

In the next few months we will be entering our annual budget cycle, which promises to raise some difficult issues. We will, as always, proceed with prudence.

ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW

At the last board meeting, Policies for Storage Sheds and Solar Panels were updated. The Storage Shed policy changed the dimensions to allow a total of 100 square feet with a 10-foot apex. Electricity is now allowed, as long as there are no visible wires to the shed. Screening is still required. All applications require a site plan of the property with the location of the shed on the plan. If the site plan is not included the application can be delayed.

The ARB currently reviews applications mid-week (Wednesdays) and we respond by the weekend with either approval, denial, or a request for more information on the project. During the summertime, we receive many applications requesting a quick reply. Please send in your application no later than Monday at 5 p.m. to ensure we can review it the same week.

The ARB would like to remind all homeowners to send in applications (found at oakhillsoregon.com/arb) for the following improvements:

- Exterior Paint Colors
- Storage Sheds
- Fences (please see ARB website to verify your property line)
- Other Structures
- Exterior Remodels
- Solar Panels
- Concrete Work
- Decks
- Windows
- Siding
- Roofs
- Garage Doors

There has been an increase in the number of homes requesting painting. If you do plan to paint, Sherwin Williams and Miller Paint each have a book of pre-approved colors. If you choose a color that is not pre-approved, you will need to either submit a paint chip with your application or paint a swatch on your house for the committee to review.

Many applications need a site plan as well (sheds, fences, other structures, remodels, solar, concrete work, decks, windows). Please provide at least a sketch of your house and property line showing where the current area and the work that is to be done.

SUMMER SEASON POOL PASSES

Summer season pool passes are available to purchase in person at the Pool Office. Pool passes consist of bracelets for homeowners and their guests (see below for pricing). Bracelets must be worn for entry onto the pool deck and while swimming. Homeowners bringing guests are responsible for paying the guest fee and the actions of their guests while at OHHA pool or Rec area.

- \$50 - family swim pool pass (members living in your home)
- \$15 - guest pass bracelets (max of 4 bracelets per home), can be used unlimited times in a season, but must swim with a homeowner and are only for purchase by the homeowner.
- \$3 - non-homeowner guest fee, one time entry

I. CALL TO ORDER/COMMUNITY ANNOUNCEMENTS

A quorum of Board members was established, and the meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM.

II. APPROVAL OF PREVIOUS MEETING MINUTES –

June 5, 2019

MOTION: Lindsay Sandor made a motion to approve the June 5, 2019 meeting minutes as published in the July newsletter. Annie Hogan seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

III. BOARD DEPARTMENT UPDATES

A. Treasurer – Gerry Reeve reported:

- Last 6 weeks revenues have increased; \$35,000 in deposits, 275 pool passes sold.
- Successfully negotiated electronic access to all bank accounts, checks them every morning. Occasionally he get invoices in the AP processing system that he was not aware of—primarily pool expenses. Typically, he will phone the vendor to follow up.
- Discussion followed regarding insuring the staff is keeping the Treasurer apprised of purchases and work that is ordered.

B. Communications - Lindsay Sandor reported:

- In preparation for her upcoming maternity leave, Kristin Parks will take on the Newsletter Publication, and has set up Google Docs folders for the next 3 months of Newsletters (August Newsletter Articles re due by July 11, September articles due August 8, and October articles due September 12).
- Donna Brewer is working with the Activities Director Christina Matussek on updating the website. Annie Hogan will help if necessary. Christina is managing the Facebook page. The e-Newsletter went out for July with note about being on hold till the Fall.

- \$1,500 donations for 4th of July have come in through the website.
- Did speak with a college student to potentially help out with communications projects.

C. Architectural Review Board (ARB) - David Boyd reported:

- The committee has processed applications for: 2 decks, 1 shed, 4 fences, 1 front door painting, 1 window replacement.
- Reminded owners that committee meets on Wednesday mornings, need applications by should be submitted by Monday at 5pm to the Committee can be prepared to review them.

D. Maintenance – Jon Cole reported:

- Jarrod is continuing to evolve in his position. Drop boxes sales are under control. Jon and Jarrod are working on coordinating with owners who are doing volunteer work in the greenspace so the trailer can be provided ahead of the project.
- Sidewalk repairs are done, power has been restored to the tennis court lights and the adjacent irrigation system—one tennis court fixture is not working and the fixture may need replacement, still need to test power to sump pumps.
- Tennis court lighting is old and inefficient and does need to be considered for replacement at some time.

E. Recreation - Sheila Brewer reported:

- The 4th of July Committee will start setting up for the event at 5:30 am, there are lots of moving parts, all parts are moving forward, will all come off without a hitch. Volunteers are still needed, especially collection of donations at the late (after 9pm) shifts.
- Sheila reported that they will be using Lifeguards/Paid employees for some tasks tomorrow. Discussion followed regarding the 2020 event; there will likely be budgeted expense for use of more paid employees to help. Sheila also noted that the primary volunteer, Linda Kitchin, will be paid for her efforts this year.
- Upcoming events include: High school night, movie in the park, middle school night. The swim team has had their first meets of the season, swim lessons are full, open swim is successful.
- Discussion followed regarding lightning protocol for pools. If there is a lightning flash or thunder, swimmers must leave the pools immediately. The pools can re-open after 30 min. with no lightning or thunder.

F. RV Lot – Jana Carlson reported:

Jarrod has been doing some clean up in the lot. Discussion followed regarding adding some solar powered motion detector lighting for safety.

G. Community Affairs – Annie Hogan reported:

- Blood drive on July 26, will be at a table tomorrow to register people for the drive.

- Still looking for volunteer to help out with community project maintenance items.
- Annie is working with the local Boy Scouts on possible Eagle Scout project ideas, and working with some owners on earthquake prep information to be posted on the website.
- Regarding the Tualatin Hills Park and Rec District (THPRD) Powerline path; Annie is getting updates on where new path will be constructed.

H. Compliance – Terri Danowski reported:

Most communications have been in person and email, 2 second notices were sent to owners; mostly RV and boats parked on the street too long, at no time can anyone be living in an RV parked on the street.

Dan Badders noted that from time to time he is contacted by owners about compliance; owners think rules are arbitrary. Thanked Terri and Compliance team for their hard work enforcing the rules that all owners have agreed to abide by.

I. President's Update – No Report

IV. OWNER/GUEST CONCERNS AND/OR COMMENTS

- Owner reminded the Board about sound issues last year during the fireworks. A group of dog walkers will be cleaning all the debris from the fireworks along the greenway path.
- An owner shared that she attended an earthquake prep session a few years ago, and recently held a neighborhood session on her street; including taste testing of prepared foods. Handouts from the City of Beaverton. Were distributed.
- Owner asked about tonight's executive session; Sheila Brewer noted that they are personnel issues where agreements may need to be changed.

V. DISCUSSION TOPICS / OTHER BUSINESS

A. Playground Committee Presentation:

- Terri Danowski gave a brief recap of committee recommendations from the last meeting; the ad hoc committee had asked the Board to establish a budget, determine whether or not there would be a theme for the new equipment, and to include funding for drainage repairs to the playground area.
- The pricing is as follows: \$105,000 for Rocketship theme, \$95,000 for non-rocketship, and the committee is still hoping for a community build option.
- Jon Cole asked again about the availability of repair parts.
- It was noted that the equipment is not considered unsafe, but would not meet current safety standards; and confirmed that safety standards are set by the industry, not regulated by state or federal agencies. It was also noted that industry standards change approximately every 5 years.

- Board members expressed concern that reserve funding isn't adequate for this expense without HOA dues increase, as the anticipated replacement cost for the equipment was underbudgeted in the reserve fund. The Board reviewed estimated repair costs if the existing equipment becomes a safety concern. Discussion followed regarding whether the current pricing could be locked in for several years until funding can be secured, as the replacement costs seem to be rising annually.
- Discussion followed about funds already in place from the sale of pavers and whether owners who purchased pavers in support of a rocketship playstructure should be offered refunds if the decision is made not to replace the equipment soon or to purchase a non-rocketship themed structure.
- It was noted by some Board members that playground replacement is seen as a lesser priority than other replacements projects in the community.
- Discussion followed regarding a timeline for a presentation to the owners regarding the effects of not raising enough revenue in HOA dues to maintain the association.
- The committees proposed schedule was to vote at this meeting, complete the grant application, take delivery by December 21, install in January or February of 2020 for professional build or April/May for community build.

MOTION: Dan Badders made a motion to accept the current recommendation from the committee to move forward now with commitment to replace play structure in the timelines as laid out by the committee. Jana Carlson second the motion, but it failed with all opposed.

MOTION: Annie Hogan made a motion to reopen the brick sale to start fundraising again for general fundraising. David Boyd seconded the motion, and it carried unanimously.

C. ARB Policy Recommendations

MOTION: Annie Hogan made a motion to approve the changes to the ARB Guidelines as presented. Terri Danowski seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

VI. ADJOURNMENT

MOTION: David Boyd made a motion to adjourn to executive session at 9:19. Terri Danowski seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

MOTION: Once reconvened, Dan Badders made a motion to adjourn at 9:40 pm. Terri Danowski seconded, and the meeting was adjourned.
